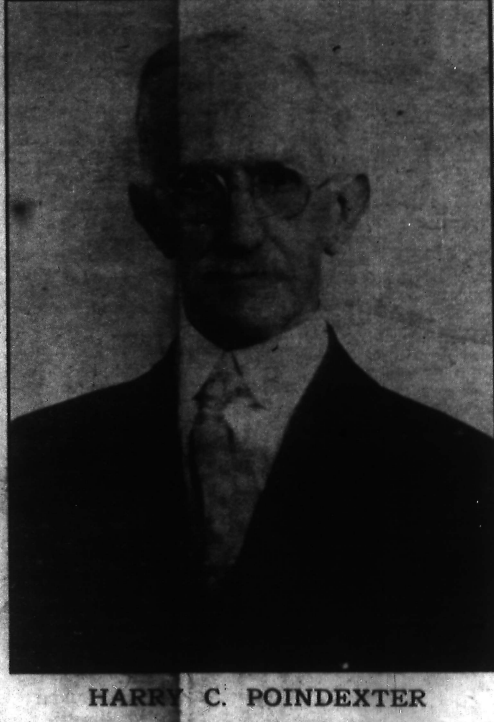

The Rally Day Sunday School is to begin at 9:30 o'clock on Sunday morning. At 10:30 o'clock a rally day communion is planned. Every member of the church is urged to attend these services on Sunday, the pastor has stated.

The Rev. S. J. Cross, pastor of the Wall Street Methodist Church has announced a special program in connection with the day's observance at Wall Street. The morning theme of the pastor's sermon is to be "Spirit-Filled and Spirit-Empowered."

"All the Church in Sunday School, all the Sunday School in Church" is to be the slogan of the Rally Day service Sunday at St. Luke's Reformed church, the Rev. D. A. Winter, pastor has announced. Commission Urges "Clean-Up" For Bridge Opening

Louisville business men were urged Friday in a formal statement of the Louisville Municipal Bridge Committee, to paint and clean up downtown stores in preparation for the celebration of the opening of the new municipal bridge from Jeffersonville to Louisville on Nov. 1.

The statement called attention to the fact that thousands of persons from Southern Indiana, representing enormous buying power, are making arrangements to visit Louisville for the span dedication and declared that these visitors "will promptly form the habit of making regular buying trips after the celebration is over."

"There are more than 700,000 residents in the thirty-one Southern Indiana counties immediately north of Louisville," the statement said. "There is hardly a community in these thirty-one counties which is not within three or four hour's automobile ride of the Louisville Municipal Bridge.

"These residents are being invited to Louisville for a mammoth opening celebration to be held Friday, November 1. It is assured that thousands of people will be present. The

From my investigation of the proceedings, I find that during the Territorial days, the Indians with violations of the law.

They seemed to be peaceful in disposition, and not given to molesting the quietude of the earlier part of the country, about over the hills on one occasion and then by the records of the early histories of Indiana on the history of Indiana to the "Pigeon Roost Settlement."

This occurred in the Scott County about 15 miles north of the line of Scott Counties, and Underwood, on the territory 1812; in what was the Pigeon Roost Settlement consisted of about a square mile and was separated from the elements by a distance of miles.

Indians Killed
On the afternoon of September 1812, a party consisting of ten or twelve men, nearly all of whom were from the Pigeon Roost Settlement, were hunting for beaver in the woods, then about six miles from the Pigeon Roost Settlement and killed one man, sixteen children. One of the children, Jane Biggs, with her mother, was taken to the Pigeon Roost Settlement and arrived at the house of Zebulon Collins, six miles from where the massacre took place.

William Collins as John Norris defended against the attacks of the Indians. There were two houses. As soon as the dark Mr. Collins and his family escaped with the two children of the morning of the massacre reached the house of Zebulon Collins. It is said that the murdered were buried in one grave.

200 Named in 129 Indictments In Lake County

MAYOR, CHIEF OF POLICE OF EAST CHICAGO NAMED IN GRAND JURY DOCUMENTS

South Bend—More than 200 persons in Lake county were named in 129 indictments returned by the Federal grand jury here Friday as a result of the jury's inquiry into charges of lawlessness and official corruption in the Calumet district.

The jury returned a total of 181 indictments, twenty-one of which named twenty-eight persons in the South Bend division and thirty in the Fort Wayne division naming fifty-eight persons.

No indictments were returned in connection with alleged election frauds.

There were fifty-three secret indictments returned naming eighty persons in Lake county. United States District Attorney John M. Loomis stated that there would be "some surprises" in connection with the arrests of the persons named in these indictments, indicating that some of the "higher-ups" are involved, although he refused to state directly that any other Lake County officials were indicted.

One of the most widespread conspiracies to defeat Federal laws, since the indictment in 1925 of Roswell O. Johnson, former mayor of Gary, who, with fifty-four others were sentenced to Federal prison on conspiracy charges was alleged by the grand jury in the true bills affecting Lake county.

Chief among those known to have been indicted were Raleigh P. Hale mayor of East Chicago, and James E. Regan, his chief of police, who are named in a general conspiracy indictment, charging violation of the national prohibition laws.

Named in another indictment was Lester Ottenheimer, an attorney of East Chicago, charged with attempting to obstruct justice. Ottenheimer is alleged to have attempted to take some papers from Department of Justice agents several weeks ago.
